# DAY 1 Monday Nov 4 Depart Toronto.

DAY 2 Tuesday Nov 5 Arrive <u>MEXICO CITY</u>, the capital of Mexico, known as Ciudad de Mexico or CDMX since 2013, built on the ruins of the Aztec capital of Tenochtitlan. After breakfast, we leave for Mass at the **Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe**, world's most visited shrine, Patroness of the Americas, Empress of Latin America and Patroness of the Unborn, at the foot of Tepeyac Hill where she appeared four times to the Aztec peasant convert Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin in December 1531 and also once to his uncle Juan Bernardino. We venerate the image of our Lady as imprinted on Juan Diego's now over 400 years old TILMA. Then, to the Square of the Three Cultures (refers to the three periods of Mexican history: pre-Hispanic, Spanish colonial and independent modern) in <u>TLATELOLCO</u> to visit the **Church of Santiago** built as a symbol of Spanish conquest in 1521 and where Juan Diego was baptized. We continue to <u>TULPETLAC</u> to visit the **Church of the Fifth Apparition of Our Lady** to Juan Bernardino. Lunch. Then, sit back and enjoy a panoramic tour of downtown Mexico City, to the tree-lined Paseo de la Reforma, modeled after Champs-Elysees in Paris with monumental glorietas (roundabouts), El Angel, the gilded icon of Mexico City patterned after Nike the Greek goddess of victory for Mexico's 1910 Centennial of War of Independence from Spain, the huge Zocalo (Plaza de la Constitucion), the heart of the city with the Cathedral, Templo Mayor, National Palace to Chapultepec Park with the Museum of Anthropology, the Pinos, the Presidential palace, the Castle, Alameda Park,

Monumento a la Revolucion. Dinner and overnight in Mexico City. DAY 3 Wednesday Nov 6 We visit north of Zocalo on Plaza Santo Domingo, steeped in history, the Church of Santo Domingo, first built by the Dominicans in 1576, has several chapels: to the Virgin of the Rosary, to Our Lady of Covadonga who appeared to Dom Pelayo king of Asturias, defeated the Moors in 722, start of Reconquista of Spain and the statue of Christ carrying the Cross known as the Lord of the Rebozo (Lord of the Shawl) from the story of a nun on a convent who gave a beggar at the door, food and a shawl; when she died the next day, the shawl was found on this statue of Christ to which the nun prayed for 30 years, moved to this church when the convent closed and people would pray in front of the statue and leave a shawl. Then, we visit the Parroquia de Sagrada Familia for the relic of Blessed Miguel Pro, priest-martyr of the Cristero War against anticlerical movement, famous for his supreme courage and his cry of " VIVA CRISTO REY" upon execution without trial. Then, on to the Church of San Jose del Altillo to visit the tomb of Blessed Maria Concepcion Cabrera Arias de Armida known as Conchita, great mystic of the 20thc, wife, mother, widow, with her voluminous writings, founder of several apostolates under "Works of the Cross." Dinner. For a taste of the music, dance, traditions, costumes of regions of Mexico with the Ballet Folklorico de Mexico at Palacio de Bellas Artes, a magnificent, colossal Art Nouveau, Neoclassical cultural center with pre-Hispanic details, a theatre, museums, elegant cafeteria, bookshop. Overnight in Mexico City.

DAY 4 Thursday Nov 7 On the way to TLAXCALA, chief ally of Hernan Cortes in the conquest of Mexico, we visit the Shrine of San Miguel del Milagro, the site of the incredible apparition of St. Michael the Archangel to the 17-year-old Diego de San Lazaro on April 25, 1631 during the procession with the message to get water from the ravine that will bring healing to the plague victims in town. Not far is the ornate Churrigueresque Basilica of Our Lady of Ocotlan, with the story of the apparition of the Blessed Virgin to Juan Diego Bernardino in 1541 to go to the spring near the pine grove to restore health. The Franciscan monks went to look for the source but found instead a burning pine (species of ocotlan) that is not consumed and when split was found an intact image of the Virgin and placed on the altar of the shrine they built. Then, towering ahead above the plains are four great volcanoes esp. Popocatepetl, the Aztec's "Smoking Mountain" and Iztaccihuatl, their "White Lady" as we find our way to the valley of PUEBLA, a prosperous colonial town of 2 million, called "City of Angels" for its perfectly aligned downtown layout believed to be designed by angels, "most traditional, staunchest Catholics" in all Mexico, a United Nations Patrimony of Humanities site, for its history, Renaissance-Baroque architecture, overflows with abundant, impressive religious structures of so many ex-convents, monasteries, churches, known also for its ubiquitous, famous glazed blue and white Talavera tiles from local clay and volcanic soil, proud of having invented the complex mole sauce of chilis, nuts and chocolate, headquarter and largest Volkswagen factory. Brief stop at the Parian, the market. We visit the spectacular Cathedral-Basilica of the Immaculate Conception of Puebla, founded by Philip II of Spain, consecrated in 1649, a UNESCO World Heritage site. Visit Church of Santo Domingo with the incredible 17thc Mexican Baroque with gilded stucco and onyx stonework, Chapel of the Holy Rosary. Next on to CHOLULA means "Place Where The Waters Spring From," a small town with the world's largest pyramid, the Piramide Tepanata, seven structures superimposed, 8 km tunnels dug underneath, can walk in. On the very top is the 16thc Santuario de Nuestra Senora del Remedios built with carved stone and 24-carat gilt lamella. Visit the amazing 17thc Church of Santa Maria Tonantzintla, with an explosion of Baroque local Amerindian decor ornate plastic faces, masks, fruits, flowers, birds. Dinner and overnight in Puebla.

DAY 5 Friday Nov 8 We go to the massive Zocalo, the largest, most famous main square in downtown Mexico City for the Mass at the Metropolitan Cathedral of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. From the outside, we view the National Palace for government offices, as Mexico's President, with the highlight on Mexican artist Diego Rivera's murals on the History of Mexico from Conquest to Independence to Revolution. Then we visit Secretaria de Educacion Publica, an ex-convent from 1594 with Rivera's murals on diverse influences on Mexico. Now comes a highly recommended, in itself "reason enough to visit Mexico City," world-class, most outstanding, greatest archaeological collections, not to be missed, definitely a CDMX highlight, so, let's take time for the National Museum of Anthropology. Next we go to COYOACAN to visit the 16thc Parroquia San Juan Bautista with lavish, ornate interior. Pass by Museum of renowned Mexican artist Frida Kahlo, wife of Diego Rivera. For a fun experience, we go to XOCHIMILCO, designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1987, famous for its floating gardens on canals, a ride in trajineras (boats) while serenaded by mariachis. Dinner and overnight.

DAY 6 Saturday Nov 9 Guided tour of the Old and New Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe on Tepeyac Hill to include the Chapel of the Indians, Chapel of the Well, Capilla del Pocito, Capilla del Cerrito de los Angeles. Lunch. Then we go to <u>TEOTIHUACAN</u>, an impressive preChristian city of the ancient world, abandoned, then taken over and held sacred by the Aztecs, excavations in 1906 slowly revealed a colossal, best preserved major archaeological site, a 2-mile long Avenue of the Dead that leads to the spectacular Pyramid of the Sun and Pyramid of the Moon, temples, palaces, chambers, tunnels. Not known who built it. Farewell dinner in Mexico city.

DAY 7 Sunday Nov 10 Flight back to Canada after a most exciting and great discovery of the wonders of Mexico. Thank God always for everything.
